## City Manager Update – 2/10/23


Winter Storm Mara came and went without significant impact to the City of Smithville. Smithville ISD and City offices either delayed opening and/or shut down during the 2-3 day event. We were fortunate not to lose as many trees as our Central Texas neighbors. The winter weather event passed and we returned to normal operations late Thursday, February 2, 2023. Special THANKS to the Smithville PD, Public Works, and Utility Departments for their quick response to water leaks and power outages in less than favorable conditions.

With less than a month to go, Smithville is still leading the competition in the "extra small" community category (population < 5,000) for the 2023 "IT'S TIME TEXAS Community Challenge". La Joya and Stockdale are currently in 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> place behind Smithville. Each year, Texans compete in the free, state-wide competition to see which communities can demonstrate the greatest commitment to healthy living. The winning community in each size category will receive recognition for their health-related efforts, along with a trophy, school district banner, and Governor's certificate. Approximately 225 community members from Smithville have registered to participate. Thanks to all who are currently participating in this competition. Below you will find a list of accomplishments, activities, issues, and/or future plans since my last report:

- 1) Wastewater Rates Three Month Winter Water Average Wastewater rates in Smithville are set by using a three (3) month "winter" water use average between DECEMBER and FEBRUARY. You can reduce your monthly wastewater (sewer) bill by conserving water during these months. In the event that the monthly water usage for any month is less than the computed "winter water average," the lesser of the two shall be used as the basis for calculating the wastewater bill. Residential customers pay a \$15.00 sewer base rate per month and \$4.00 sewer fee per 1000 gallons of water used. Cut back on water use between December and February and let the savings begin! - 2) Residential Cost Per Kilowatt Hour (kWh) Calculated An analysis of LCRA billing data was conducted to determine residential cost per kilowatt hour (kWh) in February. LCRA fuel costs vary month to month and are based upon utility generation, transmission, line loss, and service fees. The LCRA fuel cost per kWh for February is \$0.0678. This represents a 24.40% DECREASE compared to January's fuel cost of \$0.0897. Adding the City's distribution fee of \$0.0500 and LCRA's \$0.0678 fuel cost, the cost per kWh for residential service in Smithville during FEBRUARY will be \$0.1178. Below you will find a "rolling" 12-month residential cost per kWh and a fuel cost comparison chart. Generally speaking, it costs more to heat a residence than it does to cool it as there is a greater outdoor temperature difference to make up to achieve what most folks consider "comfortable" inside.....68°F in winter and 78°F in summer. The Texas PUC has energy-savings tips on their website → https://www.puc.texas.gov/consumer/facts/Save.aspx. On average, the cost per kWh for residential electric service in Smithville is between 12-13 cents.

- 3) <u>City-Wide Clean-up / Used Tire Collection / Electronics Recycling Event Scheduled</u> On Saturday, February 18, 2023 (from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm), the City of Smithville will partner with the City of Bastrop, Keep Smithville Beautiful, Bastrop County, and Lee County to hold a <u>USED TIRE and ELECTRONICS RECYCLING EVENT</u> at the Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) facility located at 109 Taylor and SE 2nd Street in Smithville. In addition, the City will be sponsoring its annual CITY-WIDE CLEAN-UP.
- 4) February Utility Billing DELAYED due to Winter Storm Mara Local Post Office operations were significantly impacted by Winter Storm Mara due to multi-day power outages and road closures in Austin. As such, the City of Smithville utility billing was delayed. Utility customers should have received their utility bill by Wednesday, February 8, 2023. Normally, payment is due by the 10th of the current month for the previous month's usage. Due to the Post Office delay, utility customers will have until Tuesday, February 21, 2023 to make payment without incurring any late penalty. This applies to the current billing cycle only. Customers with PAST DUE accounts will still be charged a penalty for any PAST DUE amount greater than 30-days. Customers who have set-up auto-draft payments through e-billing were not impacted. - 5) <u>City-wide Street Repairs and Paving Project Update</u> City-wide road paving and street repair will commence in the spring and early summer timeframe. The streets and roads listed below will be prepped, resurfaced, and repaved. The Bastrop County Maintenance Department (who owns the paving equipment) will be doing the majority of the work with support from the City of Smithville. This project will require partial and temporary street closures with notification of area residents and business owners 24-48 hours in advance. Pot-hole repairs will continue throughout town as pot-holes are reported and/or identified. Citizens can report a pot-hole using the Smithville <u>SEE/CLICK/FIX</u> link on the City Website or by downloading the SEE/CLICK/FIX app to their smart phones.

6) 2023 State-of-the-City Presentation Provided at Quarterly Chamber Luncheon — On Wednesday, January 25, 2023, a State-of-the-City presentation was provided during the Smithville Chamber of Commerce quarterly luncheon. 7) Smithville City Council and Smithville ISD Candidate Filing / Election Schedule — Smithville City Council and Smithville ISD candidate filing for the upcoming election in May began Wednesday, January 18, 2023. Persons interested in filing to run for City Council (Place 1, Place 2, or Place 3) or SISD Trustee (Place 1 or Place 2) can pick up a candidate packet at City Hall or the Smithville ISD administrative building accordingly. The deadline to file is February 19, 2023. Early voting starts April 24, 2023 and ends May 2, 2023. Election Day is Saturday, May 6, 2022 (7:00 am to 7:00 pm). - 8) 2021-22 Fiscal Year Financial Audit Scheduled The 2021-22 fiscal year annual financial audit will begin Tuesday, February 21, 2023. Last year, the City received a "clean" financial audit for our prior fiscal year's performance and compliance with government accounting standards. This year's annual audit is being conducted by Singleton, Clark & Company over a 2-week period. The focus of the audit will be on internal financial controls, payroll, procurement, HR, accounts payable, and accounts receivable, etc. Reconciliation of multiple federal, state, and local grants for infrastructure improvement has triggered the requirement to conduct a single audit. The Code of Federal Register Regulations (CFR), Title 2, Chapter II, Part 200, Subparts A through F requires Federal grant recipients to submit a Single Audit report if, in the fiscal year, \$750,000 or more was expended in Federal Grant Awards (all sources combined). Approximately \$1.2M in federal and state grants were awarded to the City of Smithville during 2022 for sidewalks, bullet-proof vests, drainage improvements, and ARPA funding. The results of the annual financial audit will be presented by Jack Clark during the April 10, 2023 Council meeting.
- 9) Waste Management, Inc. (WMI) Rate Increase to be Considered by City Council Waste Management, Inc. (WMI) is requesting an 8% increase in the current residential and commercial garbage rates. Contract rate increases are based upon the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) and the Energy Information Administration of the US Department of Energy ("EIA/DOE") diesel fuel adjustment compared to the prior year. Per Section 8.03 of the current contract, there is a 5% cap on annual rate adjustments. The current residential garbage rate that the City charges customers is \$38.50 / month. WMI currently charges the City \$29.35 / month per residential customer. The new monthly residential rate charged to the City (at 5%) will be \$30.81 The difference in the monthly rate between what the City charges and what the City pays helps cover the cost for providing leaf and limb service. At this time, I do not recommend passing any increase onto residential and/or commercial accounts as the 5% annual increase has already been included in the FY22/23 budget. However, given the current rate of inflation, raising solid waste rates should be considered during the next budget cycle. We are one of the few municipalities in the Central Texas area that still offers 2X per week garbage service, bulk service, AND leaf / limb pick-up service. This will be an item for discussion and action at the February 13, 2023 City Council meeting.

10) <u>City of Smithville Sales Tax Update</u> - Below are the sales tax allocations for February 2023 vs. February 2022 (retail sales made primarily in December 2022). This data reflects RETAIL sales of goods and services subject to LOCAL sales tax. Our sales tax payment (receipt) for January was \$94,558. This represents a **2.75% INCREASE** (\$2,534) in our net payment compared to the same time last year. As a reminder, revenue from local sales tax is used to offset expenses for community services like fire, police, leaf/limb pick-up, garbage pick-up, and the public library. Remember --- Shop Local....it makes a difference!"
