
Jamboree preparations at Riverbend Park are in full swing. The annual celebration will mark the 63rd year for the Critter. On behalf of the City of Smithville, I would like to extend a THANK YOU to the members of the Jamboree Committee for their efforts. This event takes months to plan and most folks in the community never give a second thought about what it takes to pull off a community celebration of this magnitude and duration. Riverbend Park is looking great. Kudos to Jack Page and his team for paying attention to detail and going the extra mile mowing, weed-eating, and trimming trees at Riverbend Park. Jack's crew will also be removing dirt and debris from the curbs and "gutters" along Loop 230. Loop 230 will be closed from 1:30 − 4:30 pm on Saturday, April 23rd for the Jamboree parade. We plan to put an alert on the city website and FB page communicating the Loop 230 closure and reminding folks about the parade.

Here is a list of accomplishments, issues, and planned activities since my last report:

- 1) 2022 LCRA "Steps Forward Day" Project Approximately 30 volunteers from LCRA participated in the 2022 Steps Forward Day on April 1, 2022. "Steps Forward" is an LCRA company-wide day of service where LCRA employees "pay it forward" by volunteering to support community projects throughout the region. Last year, LCRA volunteers painted the Smithville Community Gardens building (a city-owned facility) located on SE 2nd Street. This year, LCRA volunteers helped the Smithville Police Department trim bushes and install new landscape timbers. A second project was also approved to paint the restrooms (exterior) at Riverbend Park. LCRA volunteers and City workers began their day at 8:30 am for a safety briefing with trimming and painting taking place between 9:00 am and noon. Lunch was provided to all who volunteered. The City is fortunate to have LCRA as a community partner. Programs like Steps Forward and the Community Development Partnership Program (CDPP) have definitely made a positive impact in our community.
- 2) Residential Cost Per Kilowatt Hour (kWh) Calculated An analysis of LCRA billing data was conducted to determine residential cost per kilowatt hour (kWh) in April. LCRA fuel costs vary month to month and are based upon utility generation, transmission, line loss, and service fees. The LCRA fuel cost per kWh for April is \$0.0699. This represents an 8.27% INCREASE compared to March's fuel cost of \$0.0646. Adding the City's distribution fee of \$0.0500 and LCRA's \$0.0539 fuel cost, the cost per kWh for residential service in Smithville during APRIL will be \$0.1199. Hopefully, with the spring weather, citizens will see some relief in their electric bills. Below you will find a "rolling" 12-month residential cost per kWh and a fuel cost comparison chart. On average, the cost per kWh for residential electric service in Smithville is between 12-13 cents.

3) <u>EIA-861 Annual Electric Power Industry Report Submitted</u> — The City submitted the 2021 Energy Information Administration's (EIA) Form EIA-861, "Annual Electric Power Industry Report." The annual report identifies the revenue generated, Megawatt Hours (MWh) used, line loss, and the number of customers for whom the City of Smithville provided power during 2021. Here is a summary of electricity usage from 2015-2021:

As you can see by the data above, we had a slight increase in the number of utility customers served in 2021. We added 24 new customers for a total of 2,772. The City's consumption in megawatt hours (MWh) was 2.9% less in 2021 compared to 2020. However, there was an increase in revenue of \$319k compared to the prior year. The City incurred an \$848k surcharge from ERCOT for the 2021 arctic winter event that we must repay over 3-years (approximately \$23k per month). Our line loss in 2021 was calculated at 8.67% (a 13% DECREASE from 2020). This includes losses due to inefficient transformers, uninsulated lines, and unmetered sales / use (e.g., street lights). EIA Electric Surveys are mandatory under the authority of the Federal Energy Administration Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-275), as amended. The annual EIA-861 report was compiled and submitted well before the April 30, 2022 deadline. Nice work Nadine Harris!

- 4) CenterPoint Energy Annual Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program (GRIP) Interim Rate Adjustment (IRA) The City is a member of the Alliance of CenterPoint Municipalities ("ACM"). The ACM group was organized by a number of municipalities served by CenterPoint Energy Resources Corp., South Texas Division ("CenterPoint") and has been represented by the law firm of Herrera Law & Associates, PLLC (through Mr. Alfred R. Herrera) to assist in reviewing applications to change rates submitted by CenterPoint. CenterPoint Energy is asking the Texas Railroad Commission for a Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program (GRIP) Interim Rate Adjustment (IRA) to their base rate(s). Under Texas law (re: Gas Utilities Regulatory Act), we do not have the ability to oppose the rate increase. However, we can postpone the effective date of the proposed increase for 45-days. The rate will be increased by \$2.11/month for residential service and \$4.37/month for small commercial service. The adjusted monthly charge (base rate) will be \$27.03 and \$41.42 respectively. This represents an average increase between 6-9%. The rate increase will help recover incremental spending for capital infrastructure improvements in its South Texas Division during the 2022 calendar year. The proposed IRA will become effective on May 2, 2022 unless the City chooses to suspend the IRA effective date until June 16, 2022. This will be an item for consideration during the April 11, 2022 Council meeting.
- 5) PHI Air Medical Transportation Contract / Renewal Agreement Under Consideration The City of Smithville is considering renewing its contract agreement with PHI Air Medical to provide "no cost" emergency medical air transport of citizens with life-threatening injuries / illnesses that reside within the Smithville City Limits. The proposed annual fee of \$11,935 is based on providing coverage to approximately 1705 households (as identified by the most current list of residential utility customers). The plan will cover all Smithville citizens while they are in PHI Service Area (i.e., Bastrop County) at a cost of \$7.00 per household. For those citizens with insurance (including Medicare patients), the agreement will cover all co-pays, deductibles, and remaining balances for PHI transports. For those without insurance, the agreement will cover payment in full. For those citizens on Medicaid, PHI will receive a payment from the state. Citizens can upgrade to a full national household membership for \$45 per year that will provide coverage outside of the Bastrop County service area. On average, the cost for medical air transport in large metropolitan areas is \$10-15k per flight. However, the average cost for citizens in Bastrop County for medical air transport is \$45-50k. In 2020 and 2021, there were five (5) and fourteen (14) PHI Air Medical transports in Smithville respectively. This will be an item for discussion during the Monday, April 11, 2022 Council Meeting. - 6) FY20-21 Financial Audit Completed Singleton, Clark & Company, PC completed the annual audit of the City of Smithville's 2020-21 financial statements during the month of March. The results of the audit indicate that assets exceed liabilities by \$16,150,167 at the close of the past fiscal year. The total net position of the city increased by \$557,434 (General Fund increased \$95,817 and Utility Fund increased \$461,617). The City's governmental fund reported a combined fund balance of \$1,730,966, a decrease of \$525,966 in comparison with the prior year (this was due to costs associated with sidewalk repairs and rebuilding the Chamber of Commerce Office / Railroad Museum / Visitor Center). The City's total debt DECREASED by \$685,796 during the fiscal year. The debt at the end of the fiscal year was \$8,248,072. This includes bonded debt from the issuance of certificates of obligation, Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds (QEBC) and leased capital equipment. Overall, the City received a "clean" financial audit. Jack Clark will be presenting the results of the financial audit during the April 11, 2022 City Council meeting.
- 7) <u>City of Smithville Sales Tax Update</u> Below are the sales tax allocations for April 2022 vs. April 2021 (retail sales made primarily in February). This data reflects RETAIL sales of goods and services subject to LOCAL sales tax. Our sales tax payment (receipt) for April was \$55,574. This represents a **25.05% INCREASE** in our net payment compared to the same time last year. Smithville's year-to-date sales tax payments total \$505,034. Sales tax dollars are used to make street / road repairs and help pay for community services like FIRE and POLICE. Please remember to SHOP LOCAL it makes a difference!!!

- 8) City Council Approves Amended Sound Ordinance During the March 14, 2022 meeting, the City Council unanimously approved amending the City's Sound Ordinance (re. Chapter 8 Offenses and Nuisances, Article 8.04 Nuisances, Division 2. Noise). In the past, individuals, organizations, and business owners were required to obtain an outdoor amplified sound permit and were limited to two (2) events in 30-day period. The maximum permissible noise level with a sound permit was 85 dBA from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm. Business owners hosting live music events felt the ordinance created a financial hardship by limiting their ability to attract patrons with amplified live music. Citizen felt amplified live music created a nuisance noise in adjacent residential areas. In response, the City established a task force to address the issue(s). After receiving community input during multiple stakeholder meetings, council workshops, and public forums; benchmarking other municipalities; and conducting an outdoor sound demonstration at Gazebo Park, the following modifications have been incorporated into the ordinance:
 - Eliminated requirement to obtain an Outdoor Amplified Sound Permit
 - Removed restriction that limits the number of amplified events during 30-day period
 - Redefined acceptable sound levels as measured at Generator's property line (see below)
 - Redefined Day-Time / Night-time Hours (see below)
 - Established Friday / Saturday Hours (see below)
